## **Community Garden**

Students and staff are busy "putting the garden to sleep". We have officially picked all produce out of the garden and last week, several families stayed after school to pull up plants for the season. We picked all pumpkins and have placed them around the school, individual classrooms are using them for projects, and feel free to grab one or two on your way out! The extra pumpkins are near the front doors of the school. Mrs. Bowe has been working with students to plant a garlic bed before the cold sets in. This will be a great addition to our garden for next season. Soon enough Mr. Riley will be back to till up the garden for the season, excluding the berry patches, garlic and sunflower stalks. These stalks can become homes for some bees during the winter months.

The garden's first year was a huge success. We were able to donate produce to the senior meal sites at the Rec. Center and Trinity Lutheran Church. As well as to the Waupaca Food Pantry. We did not have an overly diverse garden but were able to donate overall several hundred pounds of potatoes, greens, tomatoes, zucchini, various squash, cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage and peppers.

Garden produce also added to Mrs. Ristow's FACE classes with recipes such as kale chips, veggie soup, and salsa. Mrs. Wolff's and Ms. Seifert's classes used potatoes in some inquiries during our first project cycle and created several recipes made from potatoes. With our abundance of pumpkins, several classes are doing mini- inquiries with them during the fall season.

Grades 2-3 did inquiries together in class to learn about how to research. Then all grades designed the product or presentations. The last step was to present our work.


On the night of October 3rd, family and community gathered to hear what we learned.

### YEAR TWO BEGINS!

It was with great excitement that we embarked on a new school year!

Younger students in a mixed group of 2nd and 3rd graders arrived with eagerness to embark on projects. Returning students taught new students all about the project process, the personalized learning plans, the CEC code of expectations, and mindfulness. But it isn't all the same as last year. There are new activities for returning students too!

Suzuki string instrument instruction is underway for grades 4-6. All students in these classes are learning to play a violin, viola, cello, or bass. We found out that parents sometimes need lessons as well!

Physical Activity classes have changed for all grade levels. These time periods now incorporate community service projects. Students have painted the garden shed, cleared the brush from trails, weeded the garden, and hauled equipment as part of physical activity; in addition to traditional games, hiking, and kayaking.

Students in grades 4-6 are experiencing elective courses that were chosen by them at the end of last year. Classes are up and running in online Foreign Language instruction, Makerspace, Art, Choir, and Family and Consumer Science.

As we complete our first project cycle this month, all students will meet with their Advisors to reflect and assess their performance on the first project in relation to standards covered, 21st Century skills developed, and of course-the development of a personal interest or inquiry.
